Dear Fellow Traveller:

Once again I'm sharing a few tidbits from my travel files—some personal impressions in the life and times of yours truly, and the news and views as seen through the eyes of a contemporary world traveller. Plus an update of my tours and safaris.

I'm now home for a while after two very stimulating and rewarding tours, to **Botswana and Zambia** and then to **South Africa and Zambia**. As usual, far too many highlights to mention, but suffice to say everyone had a good time. Among many thrilling experiences on my latest trip was our record sighting of 62 rhino in South Africa. And in Zambia, while my tour members enjoyed elephant rides and helicopter flights over Victoria Falls, I got to sit and walk with lions! What a remarkable experience! It is a new excursion created to rehabilitate orphaned lions, from small cubs to fully grown animals, back into the wild. As you may imagine, I was a little apprehensive at first. But after a few minutes in their presence I relaxed and enjoyed a short walk with them in the African bush! You may have noticed that I always talk about the big game that we encounter on my safaris, and seldom mention the small fry that we often come across, such as the busy dung beetle, the leopard tortoise, the chameleon, and the multicoloured agama lizard. But make no mistake, they too are important in the overall scheme of things, and we see and marvel at them and invariably stop to get a better look and take photographs. Did you know that the African continent is bigger than the United States, India, China, Argentina, Western Europe, and the British Isles combined? That helps account for its remarkable diversity.

Can't believe it's been two years since I had my right hip replaced with a titanium one due to osteoarthritis. I feel like a new man. I can walk normally, run, and even dance again, and most days I feel at least ten years younger than I actually am. It was no fun walking around with a limp and a cane. I'm so glad, too, that my occasional progress reports about this increasingly common ailment has helped others overcome their concerns about invasive surgery. As I've said more than once, while it's not something to look forward to, it's not such a big deal today.

I also can't believe my granddaughters, Emily and Natalie, are already toddlers. At 18 and 16 months, they are the most adorable little girls. When they were born, I was so excited that I wanted to retire immediately and spend time with them. But of course real life doesn't work like that. Hopefully, in the not too distant future, in addition to walking in the park, I'll be able to kick a ball around with them.

I must admit to a feeling of relief immediately after Barack Obama was inaugurated and he and his family moved into the White House. They are like a breath of fresh air. I liked Obama as soon as he appeared on the political scene, and think he deserved to become president. He certainly won't be able to solve all the problems facing him, but he's off to a flying start and is youthful, very smart, and willing to listen and do his best whatever it takes, and for that we should all be grateful. I hope people are not too hasty to judge him. Give him a chance—at least for a year. I also like his slogan, "Yes, we can." A can-do mindset is a winner. It should be a rallying cry for everyone, everywhere.

Like everyone else, I have been waiting to see what will happen to the prices for tours to various destinations. I would like nothing more than to say my tour prices have been greatly reduced. But any price reductions we've seen have been offset by the significant drop in the Canadian dollar against the US dollar, with which we must pay for most of our tours. Be assured, however, that if a reduction becomes applicable to any of our destinations, we will automatically apply it to your invoice before departure. I'll also post it on my website as soon as I know about it. In other words, **if the price drops before we leave, you are guaranteed the lower price.** You have my word on that.

No doubt about it, there are some great travel deals out there at the moment. But be careful—they may not always be what you expect, and you may not get what you bargain for. As always, the best advice is 'buyer beware.' You get what you pay for. But do rest assured that my travel partners and I are committed to helping you make the most of your travel experience and your hard-earned dollars.

As tourism is vitally important to many countries, particularly in Africa, parts of Asia, and Latin America, when you book one of my tours to Africa you are doing a service not only to yourself, but also to others who are in great need. Third World countries need all the help they can get, especially during these troubled times.

My next tour is to **Uganda**, famous for its primates (gorillas and chimps) and multitudes of exotic birds. We leave in early September.



A few weeks ago, **Melissa Jo Kooijman** of **Wild Africa Safaris** made a two-week visit there, and returned absolutely over the moon and giddy with excitement. Apparently, it took only ten minutes for her group to come face-to-face with the mountain gorillas—not nearly as long as she'd expected. They also saw lots of chimps. (She has two young sons herself.) As you'll see from her photos, the accommodations in Uganda are more rustic than some places we go, but clean and comfortable nevertheless. The bird and wildlife in Uganda are truly magnificent.

Melissa also handles my **Egypt and Jordan** tours. Details for the next one, in November, have now been

finalized. The tour is 16 days long, and the itinerary for Egypt remains basically the same as in years past, but instead of flying back to Cairo after our Nile cruise, we proceed directly to Amman in Jordan. There, as well as visiting the famous Petra and Wadi Rum, we'll stop at the Dead Sea and Jerash, the Roman ruins reminiscent of Turkey's Ephesus. My annual October **Kenya and Tanzania Safari**, which includes the world-acclaimed Ngorongoro Crater, Masai Mara, and fabled Serengeti, where we get to see the great migration of wildebeest and zebra, is as popular as ever. So please don't hesitate—book soon to be sure of a place.

I'll elaborate on the tours I have planned for 2010 in my summer newsletter. Meanwhile, my April **Hidden Treasures of Japan Tour**, escorted by me and my wife **Yuriko** during cherry blossom time, is creating considerable interest. This tour is being handled by **Collette Vacations**, who have arranged for us to use their local Langley, BC, office for inquiries and bookings. **Lisa Elliott** is the person handling the Japan tour file. Portrait of a Travelling Man

A version of this article was published in 1986 in the Vancouver-based British Columbia Business Examiner. It was written by Ruth Scott Philp, a retired freelance writer and teacher of English and typing who has travelled widely, taking a number of escorted tours, including three with me. I update and reproduce this article every so often for the benefit of those new to my newsletter.

Striking a blow for the shy and sensitive, I am probably the least likely world traveller who ever lived. Shy and sickly as a youngster, I was pretty hopeless at school. For years I was afraid of flying, and every time I went to sea—which was often—I was desperately seasick. It was nice to realize, after travelling all over the world and trying my hand at just about everything, that I was good at something—organizing and leading tours, and proving that some people will go to any lengths and overcome all manner of obstacles to achieve their dreams.

When Rudyard Kipling wrote, “If you can keep your head when all about you are losing theirs/And blaming it on you,” he should have added, “Then you may have the qualities to become a successful tour manager.”

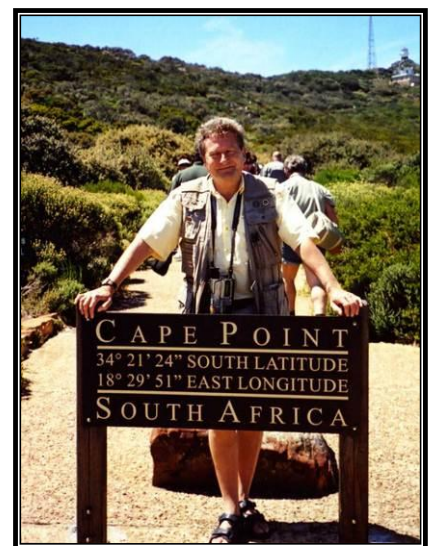
If you are an experienced tour manager, you not only keep your head, you also keep your sense of humour and your perspective. You know there may be surprises, but you are prepared to deal with them. You may find that the hotel you booked a year in advance has been overbooked; the restaurants you were prepared to recommend have folded; the weather has turned out to be unsuitable for the events you have scheduled. You smile, you give a Trudeau-like shrug, and you carry on.

As one of a group of Canadians touring Australia and New Zealand, I felt fortunate in having as a tour leader a man who has been involved in the travel business all his adult life. After performing the military service demanded of young men in England at the time, David Skillan set off in the early 1960s to achieve a boyhood ambition to see the world, carrying a pack weighing forty pounds, and with fifty English pounds in his pocket.

The young adventurer attracted a fair amount of attention from the press. An article entitled “Twentieth-Century Phileas Fogg” likened him to Jules Verne’s fictional character, who went around the world in eighty days. Skillan’s initial journey lasted eighty months. He covered 500,000 miles and delved into strange, exotic lands and foreign cities, seeking employment to finance each stage of his marathon odyssey.

Another article called “Travelling Man” mentions that Skillan has used every mode of travel except a balloon. He does admit, however, that he once had to give up an interesting job because of a tendency to seasickness. That problem has now been overcome, but meanwhile he has flown with more than seventy-five airlines and worked in a dozen countries, including Japan, Thailand, Argentina, Ethiopia, Kenya, South Africa, Australia, and New Zealand.



As we flew in comparative comfort over the Australian Outback, Skillan recalled how he had worked his way around this desolate stretch of country. He enjoys the relative luxury in which he now travels—riding a plane instead of hitching rides, eating in hotels rather than making meals out of cans or cooking over campfires, sleeping in

comfortable beds instead of sleeping bags. As the comedian says, "I've been rich and I've been poor, and rich is better." Still, Skillan never regrets the challenge and adventure of his early years of travel. Not only have they shaped him and made him the quintessential tour manager, they have also provided him with memories that most people cannot even imagine.

One writer described him as "the debonair fellow in the black turtleneck sweater." Twenty years later, Skillan's image has changed. Whether he wears a natty jacket in a colour bright enough to catch the eye of his tour group or the safari suit in which he appears very much at home, he stands out in a crowd. There is an air of confidence, of a man in command of himself and the situation. We knew him best in a short-sleeved shirt, a khaki vest, a neckerchief that was different every day, and the shorts and knee socks that appear suited to the land Down Under and that do much to show off a handsome pair of legs.

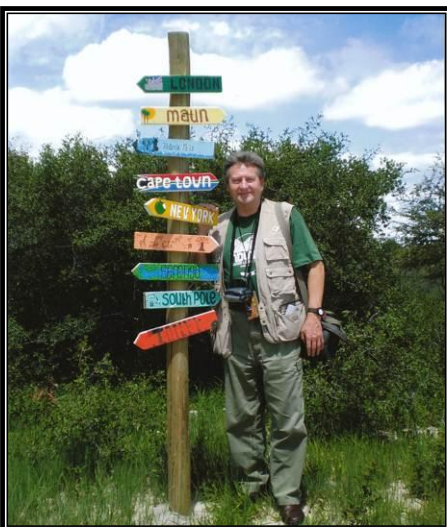
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Skillan is seldom still. The life of a tour manager is a busy one. On long-distance tours, with many departures and arrivals, he takes charge of all tickets, getting boarding passes and paying taxes, leaving tour members to relax or look around the airport. On arrival at each airport, he dashes outside to find the bus driver (or coach captain, in Australia), then directs everyone to the coach and does a head count.

As we approached each hotel, he would make a last-minute announcement over the microphone, usually emphasizing something that he had mentioned earlier. It may have been "Early call at seven tomorrow morning. Bags out before breakfast. The coach leaves at eight-thirty." Or sometimes it was "Tomorrow is at leisure." He might then have described what we could see and give suggestions on what to do, where to eat, and where to shop. He likes to see that his people get the most for their money. Perhaps he remembers when he had to count his pennies.

When the day's work is over, David may be seen swimming in the pool or on the beach, striding over the countryside or along a city street, or running to snap just the right picture, which might turn up in a magazine illustrating one of his many articles. One might expect him to be blasé, but there is a youthful enthusiasm in his expressions of delight in a breathtaking sunset, a gorgeous valley nestled between volcanic hills, or even a lovely sunny day. "Aren't we lucky to have this weather?" is how he often greets a new day.

It takes a little while to get to know David Skillan. Under an insouciant façade, he hides a core of sensitivity and old-fashioned sentiment. He likes to joke and tease members of his group, but he senses if anybody is unhappy, and when someone is in difficulty he is helpful and sympathetic. His romantic nature becomes evident when he speaks of his meeting the beautiful Tokyo-born Yuriko, followed by a two-year courtship and a traditional Japanese wedding. He is now the proud father of two lovely daughters, Julie and Jane, and grandfather of two small granddaughters, Emily and Natalie.



David Skillan is now a Canadian citizen, but his first few years here were perhaps nearly as difficult and challenging as his time spent wandering in foreign lands. In spite of a prepossessing appearance and obvious education, he had more than his share of problems and obstacles. It is a tribute to his perseverance and willingness to turn his hand to any kind of work that he has been able to parlay his love of travel and his interest in people into a successful career in the travel industry.

David never forgets the friends he made on his early travels—the people who picked up the young wayfarer and sometimes offered him the hospitality of their homes. He has tried to give back some of this help to others and to people who have travelled with him.

Perhaps this is just the romanticism in my own nature, but I felt that I would like to know what he was thinking and whether he wished himself back in the days when life was unpredictable and tomorrow always brought something unexpected. ➔
