Dear Fellow Traveller:

Compliments of the season! I am now home for a few weeks after three memorable back-to-back tours. I'll be heading to Botswana in early January.

Between arriving home from East Africa and heading off to Egypt and Jordan, I had to fly to the UK to see my gravely ill brother, Tony. Sadly, as expected for some time, he passed away shortly after I saw him. I shall be forever grateful that I could stand by his bedside and exchange some final words with him. Larger than life and younger than me by four years, he was a successful communications consultant and a big man in every way. While battling the cancer that gradually spread for 12 years, he was unfailingly cheerful, positive, and optimistic, even when facing the most dire of circumstances, including several major operations. He never complained, and soldiered on the best way he knew how. Even when he had half his liver removed, five years ago, he took life in stride, defying all the odds. He will be greatly missed by many.

It is always an emotional time when we lose a close relative or dear friend, and it has completely taken the wind out of my sails—at least for the time being. The death of someone we love makes us look at our own mortality and question why we are here. It also makes us more determined to make the most of life. In the spring I shall plant a tree in Tony's memory, as I did for my mother, who passed away a few years ago at the age of 90. It would be nice if everyone planted a tree when they lost a family member or friend. It would be good for the environment, as well as honouring a loved one.

RECENT TOURS—As I hadn't been to **Uganda** for many years, I was eagerly looking forward to going back this fall. This lush, green land is a sensational safari destination, with friendly people, mostly fine tarred roads, extraordinary bird- and wildlife-viewing opportunities, and comfortable accommodation in the form of fine hotels, tented camps, and beautiful game lodges, many with breathtaking views. We saw everything you could wish for, including all of the Big Five (elephant, lion, rhino, buffalo, leopard) and great numbers of common game—giraffe, zebra, topi, kob (Uganda's most common antelope), waterbuck, hippo, and crocodile. We also saw many primates, including olive baboons and patas, blue, vervet, black-and-white colobus, and red colobus monkeys. We had fantastic close-up views of cheeky chimps and the shy, gentle mountain gorillas. To publicize the latter's plight, the United Nations has appropriately named 2009 the Year of the Gorilla. Hiking to see them proved to be a grueling exercise, a strenuous up-and-down climb through hilly, dense forest, bushwhacking as we went. Coming across a family of eight, including two infants and two silverbacks, was a magical experience. Seeing them so close was worth all the sweat and effort. Glad to say, too, that my titanium hip (fitted two and a half years ago) stood up pretty well.

The bird life was extraordinary. Among the many species we spotted were yellow-billed storks, carmine bee-eaters, pied, malachite, and pygmy kingfishers, spoonbills, pelicans, Egyptian geese, grey herons, darters, and spur-winged geese. We even had fabulous sightings of the rare shoebill stork, which slightly resembles the long-extinct dodo bird. As if that were not a great stroke of luck, as we stared mesmerized at the shoebill, a saddle-billed stork, a very tall bird with a colourful beak, walked up and stood right next to it! Real birders (those who talk birds at breakfast, lunch, and dinner) would have gone mad with delight over such a sight.

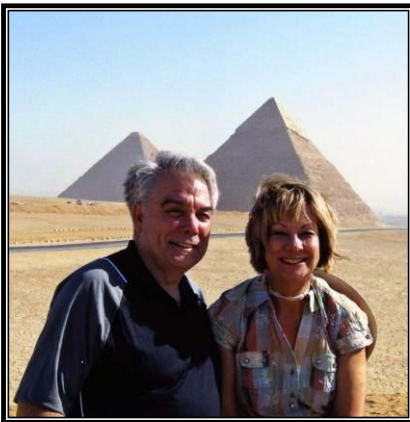


My next tour to Uganda is scheduled for February of 2011. Watch for an article about Uganda in my spring newsletter, including tips for gorilla tracking and news about the plight of these endangered creatures.

My tour to **Kenya and Tanzania** in October was one of the most productive I've ever led—and that's saying something! We always see a tremendous amount of wildlife, but this year was exceptional. We witnessed the great migration in both the Masai Mara and the Serengeti, and saw almost every bird and animal imaginable. You'll get an idea of what an amazing trip it was when you see some of the photos I took. I'll be adding them to my website in the next few weeks, and will send an email update letting you know when they're ready for your viewing pleasure.

My next Kenya and Tanzania tour, in October of 2010, will almost certainly be my last. Much as I enjoy this trip, I want to spend time visiting other African destinations. We already have nine or ten people signed up for 2010, so if you plan to join us, I'd suggest that you book soon.

My recent **Egypt and Jordan** tour was another success, as you'll see when you read some of the comments from my clients on page 9 of this newsletter. Gerry and Pat, pictured at left, happily told me on the spot, "We wanted to join your Egypt tour, and here we are!" I had intended this to be my last tour to the region, but a number of people have asked me to do another, so I will, *insha'Allah* (God willing). The brochure should be out by late January.

The price has risen significantly since I started going back to Egypt several years ago, because the tour now includes Jordan, another must-see destination. Everyone tells me it's well worth the extra dollars. Just as many visitors gasp with pleasure and amazement when they go on safari, most gasp in astonishment when they see the ancient cities of Petra and Jerash for the first time. Though different, they're as impressive as Egypt's famous sights.

Besides Fouad, the popular local guide and Egyptologist who is my right hand in Egypt, we now have Amjad, a very personable fellow who is a knowledgeable

local guide in Jordan. Like Fouad (and me, of course, at 39!), Amjad is in his mid-thirties. And my female tour members love them both!

UPCOMING TOURS—My **Botswana** (January) and **Japan** (April) tours have been sold out for some time, but there's still space on my **Peru** trip (September) and my final **Kenya and Tanzania** tour (October). Strangely, we've had no enquiries for my **South Africa** tour (March), so we've cancelled it. The next trip to South Africa, if there is sufficient interest, will be in March of 2012.



Peru is another place I'm greatly looking forward to going back to. September is a lovely time to be there. This scenically glorious country has so much to offer the traveller and explorer. I'm considering a tour of **Iceland** next May, if enough people are interested. It will be a tour of only nine days, at a very reasonable price—just \$2,999. Let me know right away if you're interested. We sometimes have wait lists for some of my tours; there's always a chance that someone will cancel.

FUTURE TOURS—I'm still considering which tours I'd like to do in conjunction with Wild Africa Safaris and Collette Vacations before I ride off into the sunset. The list includes **Turkey, China, Cambodia and Vietnam, Thailand, Costa Rica, Japan, Croatia**, the capitals of **central and eastern Europe** (Budapest, Krakow, Prague, Warsaw, Berlin, Vienna), **Greece, Ireland, Italy, Ecuador** and the **Galapagos Islands, India, Australia and New Zealand, Namibia, Tanzania, Zambia, South Africa, Botswana, Morocco, Uganda, and Zimbabwe**. I won't do them all—only those you tell me you're most interested in. If you've always wanted to see one or more of these destinations, let me know as soon as possible. 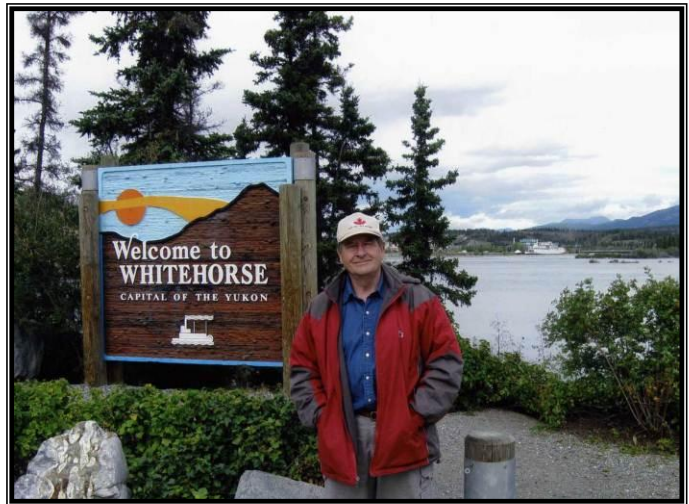

NORTH OF HERE—As mentioned in my last newsletter, I enjoyed a 10-day trip to the **Yukon** with friends last August. It was awesome—so silent, empty, and majestic, with vast forests and countless lakes that echoed to the haunting cry of the loon, one of my favourite birds. We rented an RV and headed to various places, including the unforgettable Dawson City. We visited a couple of very interesting museums and admired the dancing of some glamorous local girls in a can-can show, and peered into the original log cabins of writer Jack London and poet Robert Service. We also drove the Dempster Highway to a place called Tombstone (not Tombstone, Arizona, which I visited last spring), which is one of the most beautiful places on earth. There's no town, no store, no gas station—only an RV site off the main road—but it boasts the most spectacular scenery you're likely to see. (Shhh—don't tell anyone! Let's keep it to ourselves!) We didn't see much wildlife—only one black bear, four foxes, and a few caribou. The bird life was better.

Two people who were on my last Botswana safari, Garry and Carla, are longtime residents of Whitehorse. They run a resort and retreat centre called **Takhini Hot Springs** a few miles from the centre of Whitehorse, where we stayed for a few days. Like many retreats, it's rustic but comfortable, surrounded by woods. Carla, a gourmet cook, prepares the most delicious meals. If you intend to visit the Yukon in summer, better book your RV early, as hordes of German tourists arrive every week, and they like nothing more than renting RVs and heading into the wilds for a week or two.

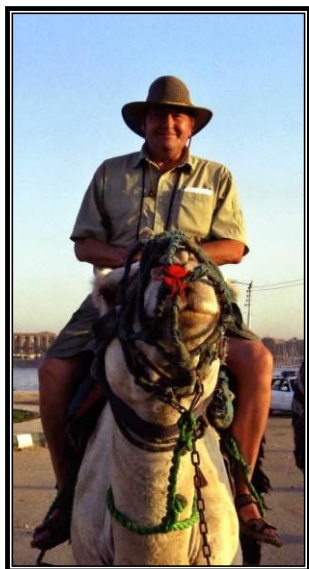

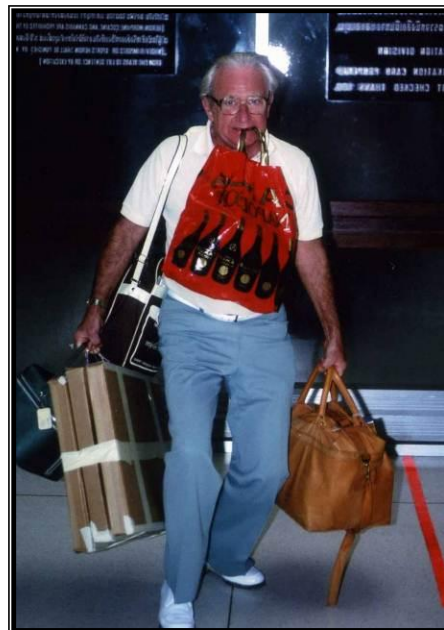

David Skillan's Travel Tips

I've published these tips before, and they bear repeating. They're valid whether you're going on safari in Africa or just overnighting in the next town. Please share them with friends and family members who like to travel.

- Before travelling, ensure that your passport is valid for at least six months, and that you have all necessary visas.
- Travel insurance provides peace of mind (and vital coverage), so be sure to buy it!
- Always carry a photocopy of your passport details in a separate place, in case your passport is mislaid or stolen and must be replaced.
- Have a dental check-up and get any necessary vaccinations well before departure.
- Never wear expensive or flashy jewellery. You could be robbed!
- Don't buy expensive luggage. All luggage takes a beating and gets thrown around a lot.
- Pack as lightly as possible. Never wear new or best clothing when travelling. Wear casual, loosely fitting garments. Dress for comfort, not to impress.
- Keep valuables such as your passport, tickets, medication, spectacles, etc., in your carry-on flight bag. Do not lock them in your suitcase.
- Remember to carry an extra battery and memory card for your camera.
- Wear a money belt, small backpack, or waist pouch in which to store such valuables as your passport, airline tickets, and travellers' cheques. This will leave your hands free.
- Always carry a good book, to pass time when flying and hanging around airports and to help you nod off at night.
- Wear a small Canadian flag pin. It makes for easy identification and is often a conversation opener.
- Always wear sunglasses and a hat in the tropical sun! This will reduce your risk of heatstroke by 75 percent. Sunscreen is also a must!
- Carry a fold-up weekend bag in your suitcase. It's useful for short excursions and/or shopping.
- Never leave valuables exposed in a hotel room. Lock them up!



- Make a point of learning how to say "please" and "thank you" in the local language wherever you go. The locals appreciate it.
- When filling out immigration forms, answer "Tourism" to the question "Purpose of visit?"
- On long flights, a mild sleeping pill helps you relax, cope with jet lag, and adjust your sleeping pattern. There's no need to tough it out!
- And remember, we're all ambassadors when we're abroad!
