Compliments of the season!


No doubt you're thinking, "What's he up to now?" as you start reading this letter. Well, there's a lot going on in my life right now, as you'll see.

LIVING IN AMERICA—Hearing about Julie’s imminent move to California got me thinking about when I lived and worked south of the parallel. It was the summer of 1968, a tumultuous year in the United States, later recognized as the most turbulent year since the American Civil War. I had a front-row seat on all the action.

A 29-year-old wanderer nearing the end of my world odyssey, I arrived in the US by train from South and Central America. I’d taught English in Bogotá and in Buenos Aires. After a few weeks in San Francisco, where I experienced the height of the hippie era and Beatlemania, I rode across the States in a red Volkswagen, camping out with Bob, a new American friend who’d heard me interviewed on the radio about my travels.

It was July of what was to become known as the Summer of Discontent. In early April, civil rights leader Martin Luther King had been assassinated, followed two months later by former US attorney general Robert Kennedy. Lyndon B. Johnson had announced that he would not run for re-election, and Richard Nixon was about to become the next president. The country was rampant with violent protests and rioting, mostly against the Vietnam war.

I lived in the Big Apple for six months before moving to Cambridge, near Boston, Massachusetts, for another three months. Unlike today, New York in 1968 was a fairly hazardous place to live. I remember always looking for the subway car with the police officer in it, to avoid being mugged. I was by then accustomed to doing almost anything to make a living, no matter how menial—cleaning bathrooms and scrubbing floors (I’ve never been afraid of getting

my hands dirty), painting apartments, and working as a carpenter's mate in the Bowery, the notorious, run-down, sleazy New York street that had been famous for shootouts between gangsters in the '30s and '40s. In 1968 it was full of drug-addicted and homeless people. It turned out to be a freezing winter, and I had to buy a decent jacket, because all I had was casual summer clothes. I worked for Everything for Everybody, a now-defunct staffing agency in Greenwich Village. In those days, like other youthful vagabonds, I never bothered to get work permits. I just looked for casual work whenever I needed money. I was prepared to do anything to get by. During my time in the United States I did a number of illustrated lectures about my travels. My most valuable possession was a large box of colour slides that I updated every so often and put to good use. My mission was simple: to share my experiences with others and perhaps inspire them to get up and explore our great big world. "Follow your passion and live your dreams" was my theme. "It might change your life, as it did mine," I told my audiences. My message obviously struck a chord with many people, for they left with broad smiles on their faces.

It was during that time that I was invited to live with a young couple in a loft on Canal Street, in a seedy district where artists and artisans—writers, photographers, poets, and potters—hung out. Today it's one of New York's most fashionable areas. My new friends' third-floor home was above a pizza parlour and Rosie's bar, where I did a brief stint as a barman. Bill was a fireman and a keen amateur photographer who was always talking about how he could make it if he could only get some of his pictures into *Life* magazine. Barbara was a receptionist at the *New York News*. I helped with the household chores and paid for my food, a convenient arrangement for all concerned. In place of a bed, they set up an old door with a mattress on a couple of chairs for me, and I slept well on it. By then I had learned to sleep just about anywhere, from railway-station platforms in India and Pakistan to roadsides in Australia and Africa.

I have always admired the American people for their generosity and friendliness, as well as for their efficiency and innovative ideas. But throughout my nine-month stay there, it was hard not to notice that no matter where I went, everyone was talking and nobody was listening—a peculiar characteristic of Americans that I still notice today. Everybody has an opinion and is determined to voice it. So much for freedom of speech! Other than that, I tremendously enjoyed living in the United States. New York was particularly exciting for an adventurous young person, and no doubt still is. Today my one and only connection with Manhattan is my nephew Paul, who is a bigwig with HSBC on Fifth Avenue.

Strangely, apart from a few days in Toronto visiting a friend, I never spent any time in Canada during my marathon world jaunt. I was to make up for that big time when I settled here with my family in the mid-1970s. I've now been here for 35 years! Hard to believe.

KEEPING THINGS IN PERSPECTIVE—I've been lucky to have experienced all kinds of weird and wonderful experiences all over the world. Despite the fact that many people think I lead a glamorous, sophisticated lifestyle, I'm actually a simple soul who enjoys life's basic pleasures. When I'm at home I live modestly—reading, writing, listening to music, spending time with my grandchildren and walking their dogs, hiking, and paddling canoes on picturesque lakes. I always have and always will.

But I never forget—indeed, thanks to my travels, I'm often reminded—that I'm where I am because of privilege and luck. I had no say in where and when I was born, yet those facts gave me a huge advantage, placing me among the world's wealthiest people. To be among the top ten percent of the world's richest people isn't difficult. To qualify, you have only to own your own home (be it a house or condo) and car, have a bank account, and enjoy a decent lifestyle. You don't have to be a millionaire . . . although to most people in the Third World, many of whom live in shacks and don't have access to clean water, it must seem that we all are.


